DOMESTIC VIOLENCE AWARENESS MONTH

October is Domestic Violence Awareness Month. Our Court hears cases involving domestic violence regularly. We are reflecting on the ways our Court helps victims of domestic violence and ways we can push for change within the legal system.

An integral function of our Court is the Order of Protection (OP) docket, heard by Special Master Dana Ballinger. Orders of Protection, according to Special Master Ballinger, "are powerful civil orders giving victims of domestic violence, stalking or sexual assault protection from further abuse from their abusers." A strength of these orders is that they "give instant protection." However, there are still barriers for people to get the help they need.

Many victims of domestic violence are unable to receive protection due to a lack of "knowledge of the system or of the existence of an Order of Protection, threats of negative consequences for the victim from the abuser for following through... [and a] lack of resources regarding housing and financial support if an Order of Protection is sought," according to Special Master Ballinger. "There are many perceived and real obstacles in the eyes of some domestic abuse victims, both procedurally and personally." There are resources, however, so that victims do not have to remain in abusive cycles nor walk through the protection process by themselves. The Family Safety Center and AGAPE have advocates who assist in the process of filing an Order of Protection, "offering information and support for the victims that might otherwise not be available if going through the process alone."

"I think we are just starting to brush the surface of issues and barriers in domestic violence cases with these new changes we are implementing; however, I have big visions of continued improvements by partnering with other professionals in the industry to expand upon resources and assistance for not only domestic violence victims, but their children and families. Programs for children of parents involved in domestic violence relationships which offer group and individual counseling, homework assistance and opportunities for physical activity and art or music instruction—even life coaching—in an environment outside of the volatile home might sound unreasonable, but I believe it can be achieved through courts like ours who are not afraid to do something different in an effort to effectuate real change."

BULLYING PREVENTION MONTH



Our mission to raise awareness continues. October is also Bullying Prevention Month, another opportunity to reflect on the people in our communities who cannot speak up for themselves. This issue is especially relevant as we continue our conversation about the impact of high conflict divorce on children. There is a strong correlation between a high conflict household and bullying. Not only does bullying have both short- and long-term impacts, similar to those children experience in a high conflict divorce, but the two often go hand in hand.

A "harsh family environment," according to the National Library of Medicine, can affect a child's ability to cope with stress. Some children may internalize the conflict while others may externalize it. A study in the Journal of Youth and Adolescence showed that, "children who bully others are more likely to come from family environments characterized by less cohesion, expressiveness, organization, control, and social orientation." This behavior is likely a result of externalizing the inner conflict they feel at home and can lead these children to bully others. On the other hand, some children may internalize the conflict, pushing them further into isolation. When a child does not feel safe enough to express and share their feelings with a trusted adult in their life, it can result in bullying--either as the perpetrator or the victim. A child's relationship with their parent(s) matters. It impacts their decision making, emotional regulation, and relational skills.

To support Bullying Prevention Month and bullying prevention every month, it is crucial that we discuss the correlation of a tumultuous home life, especially due to a high conflict divorce, with instances of bullying. The role we play in the lives of families in Davidson County should not be taken for granted. Bullying is a multifaceted problem with many causes and effects. We must play our part in creating safety for children and be part of the solution not the problem.

"Do you want your child to have a divorcecentered childhood or a child-centered divorce?"


CHAMBER RULES


